Thinking about Jose Saramago

- Saramago was born in 1922 into a family of very poor landless peasants in Azinhaga, Portugal, a small village, some one hundred kilometers northeast of Lisbon. "Saramago", the Portuguese word for Raphanus raphanistrum (wild radish), was the insulting nickname given to his father, and was accidentally incorporated into his name by the village clerk upon registration of his birth.
- Saramago's experimental style often features long sentences, at times more than a page long. Many of his paragraphs extend for pages without pausing for dialogue; when the speaker changes, Saramago capitalizes the first letter of the new speaker's clause.

- A lot of Saramago's books are available in Romanian language, too. Of course, Blindness is the most known and had a great impact in our country during the covid Pandemic.
- As you may be aware, Blindness is the story of an unexplained mass epidemic of blindness afflicting nearby everyone in an unnamed city and the social breakdown that follows.

The Tale of the Unknown Island Plot
