Student report Malaga

Monday 19th of November

On the Monday, all the country officially met with in the schools hall, we were given 20 minutes to introduce ourselves to the other country with our hosts, which was nice to get to meet people we did not meet the night before. An icebreaker was our first task of the day, we each had to stand up and introduce ourselves to the teachers and students (our names, age, where are from and our favourite thing to do in our free time,) then we were asked to write them down and the teachers would then distribute them and we would have to guess who it belonged you. We was then given more time to talk to others, which again was really enjoyable to learn about other people and their cultures.

Tuesday 20th Nov

On Tuesday we visited Antequera, Archidona. When we were there we visited some archaeological and heritage sites that had buildings underground in a circular shape. These buildings were often used as homes and were positioned in such a way that the sun would shine directly through the entrances of the building.

We also visited a museum which exhibited many interesting pieces of artwork and objects. For example some of the objects they had on show were goblets and jewelled crowns. These would be used during special ceremonies and placed upon statues.

After this we went for a traditional Spanish meal in a quaint restaurant which was positioned next to an old bull fighting ring. The food was nice but very different to what we would normally eat. It was also very different to what our hosts ate, as they would eat more modern food rather than traditional meals.

Finally we walked up to a mosque at the top of the city. Although the shape of the building resembled a mosque, the building had been converted into a catholic church. The difference between what the building was before and how it is now is remarkable as catholic churches tend to be more illustrious than mosques, whereas mosques have much simpler interior decorations.

Overall I thought the day was very educational and it taught me a lot about religion within the area. I found the mosque the most interesting as the fact that it used to be a mosque and has then been converted to a be a place of worship for another religion entirely is intriguing to me. It make me wonder why they would want to do that.
