Foreword:

This project started in September 2018 and it will last in June 2020. Six participating schools from Czech Republic, Turkey, Finland, Spain, Cyprus and Italy have been working and will work on tasks connected with the topic of the project.

Six meetings are scheduled for the period of 2018 - 2020:

1st meeting in **FINLAND**, December, 13-18, 2018 2nd meeting in **CYPRUS**, January, 23-28, 2019 3rd meeting in **ITALY**, March 31- April 5, 2019 4th meeting in **TURKEY**, October, 2019 5th meeting in **CZECH REPUBLIC**, February, 2020 6th meeting in **SPAIN**, April, 2020

Priorities;

HORIZONTAL: Social and educational value of European cultural heritage

HORIZONTAL: Development of relevant and high-quality skills and competences

SCHOOL EDUCATION: Promoting the acquisition of skills and competences

The partners are going to share the responsibilites and tasks. Six topics and six tasks were divided among all the partners according to their choice. Each school will take over the responsibility of one of the topics and one of the tasks and thus the project work will be balanced and each school will be involved in the work equally.

The partners agreed on the following distribution of the topics (1), tasks (2) and workshops (3):

CZECH REPUBLIC - 1. Music and dance, 2. website, 3. "Living in Erasmus+ world"

ITALY - 1. Traditional cuisine, 2. brochure, 3. "Share the food"

FINLAND - 1. Folk stories, narrations and theatre, 2. facebook page and group, 3. "United in diversity"

SPAIN - 1. Language and its changes, 2. video and photo-documentation, 3. "In or out"

CYPRUS - 1. People (immigration, emigration, movement of people), 2. e-Twinning, 3. "Next generation"

TURKEY - 1. Life in villages and towns, crafts, jobs, 2. newsletters, 3. "Breaking stereotypes"

ALL PARTNERS - Games of our ancestors

The project includes both local activities and mobilities (learning/teaching/training activities). The activities focus on roots and cultural heritage and include topics such as: life in the past, folk stories, music and dance, migration, cuisine or language. During the workshops we will also deal with several European issues.

In this project we are going to achieve the following objectives and concrete results:

- 1. Development of competences of the participants of the project (communication and language, cultural awareness, creative, digital, social, analytical, and moving)
- 2. Printed outputs Book of stories, a brochure about the project, a photobook, newsletters, promotional materials
- 3. Online outputs web, facebook page, e-Twinning, e-magazines, logo
- 4. Development of international cooperation in the partner schools and strengthening the cooperation of the schools with municipalities, libraries, community centres and houses of culture at the local level
- 5. Breaking stereotypes about other cultures, traditions and lifestyles
- 6. Extending the knowledge of the partner countries in the field of history, traditions, customs, ways of life, and geography
- 7. Extending (or gaining) the knowledge about various UNESCO sites.
- 8. Development of friendship with students and colleagues from partner schools
- 9. Development of awareness of the European Union issues including Erasmus+ programme
- 10. Exchange of good practices and methods of work with young people

The participants are students aged 14-19 from six countries from various parts of Europe, from various cultural, social, geographical background, their headmasters, teachers, other school staff and parents. We are going to involve public into our activities, too, particularly responsible people from municipalities, libraries, community centres.

In the activity "Interview with older people" and creating "Book of stories" old people will be involved to share their life experience. Each school will involve at least 30-50 participants in local activities and 15 students in mobilities.

During the activites we will use various methods of work - presentations, workshops, discussions and debates, interviews, excursions, seminars, lectures, role-play activities, intercultural activities etc. We are going to use methods of both formal and informal education.

The project will have a desired impact on the participating schools, it will help to start or extend their international partnerships and activities, the schools will be more popular for next newcomers and public will learn more about school activities. People not connected with schools so far can learn about the school activities and maybe find some kind of cooperation. The students and teachers of the partner schools will improve their skills and will become more interesting for the labour market.

Motivation of the students and teachers for future international cooperation will increase and the awareness about Erasmus+ programme and other matters regarding the European Union will be enlarged.

The project will help the participants to become aware of the roots, history, traditions and cultural heritage of their country and to overcome prejudices and stereotypes about other cultures.

This is an important fact particularly in countries where anti-European forces are getting stronger and in the times when Europe looks back to its roots.

The project will bring a long-time benefit for the schools, some of the materals, presentations, Book of stories as well as some methods of work can be used in the future and involved in a curriculum.

The schools will also strengthen cooperation with municipalities, libraries or community centres and will be also able to offer future students the gained experience.

And above all, the participants will gain and develop their competences and will become more educated, more cultural and more interesting for labour market.

Now,let's have a look at what the students and teachers from all participating schools have done since September 2018 until today, the beginning of January 2019. Here are the short introductions of the partner schools and their activities so far:

We opened the webpage of the project and since then we have updated it several times. You can find all the most important information, files and documents on the webpage as well as some photos from our project activities and mobilities.




November – we created our team for the 1st meeting in Finland. The students started to search for old legends and stories about our town and region. We also started our etwinning project.

December – our team finished preparations for the 1st meeting in Finland and then we finally set off for this meeting! Naantali was waiting for us! (3)

Our school: Naantalin lukio, Naantali, FINLAND

As the school year started, the personnel responsible for the project (Eija Mäenpää, Eeva Mäkinen and Sanna Vuola, later on referred to as Roots team) introduced the project in the first teachers' meeting on 13 August 2018 to all staff members of Naantali Upper Secondary School. They described the upcoming activities and project meetings during the school year 2018-2019 and introduced the participating schools. Roots team informed the staff about the progress of the preparations for the project meeting in Naantali in December 2018 in all teachers' meetings carried out in the autumn semester and also in the weekly infos for teachers on Mondays and in the weekly staff newsletter. All teachers were encouraged to participate in the activities during the project meeting in Naantali.

In the first weeks of the semester, Eeva Mäkinen introduced the project to all first graders in her lessons and encouraged them to participate. All first graders and second graders also received an invitation to participate in the project through school web service, Wilma. Students could enroll by writing a motivation letter and handing it in Google Classroom by 6 September, 2018. They were supposed to discuss the following questions in their motivation letter:

Europe is changing, the migration wave established several questions - What are our roots, our traditions? Are we aware of them, are we living with respect to them? What are similarities and differences between various cultures? Do the differences endanger our own culture? How much have our traditions changed?

Roots team evaluated the motivation letters and chose the students to participate in the project. After this, a common space for the organization of project work was created in **Google Classroom** (below)



and all participating students were invited to it. Roots Classroom will be used throughout the project for sharing files, assignments, contact information, schedules etc. and everybody can access it on mobile phones, tablets or laptops anywhere and anytime so all info is available easily. To disseminate the info about the project, Eeva Mäkinen created the FB page for the project, Eija Mäenpää gave a morning assembly to all students and teachers about the project in general and the project meeting in Naantali in particular.

After choosing the participating students, Roots team started to work on the program of the project meeting in Naantali. The application form was studied carefully so as to include all necessary items in the program. Negotiations were carried out with representatives from Naantali Parish, Naantali tourist information and Naantali Museum to enable cooperation during the project meeting. Roots team had meetings weekly and all materials were available in a shared Google Drive and each member of Roots team had their own responsibilities for the preparations.

At the same time as the preparations for the project meeting in Naantali were going on, the project coordinator kept in contact with all participating schools to gather information about the teachers and students in order to arrange their accommodation in hotels and families and also informed the guests about means of transport, weather and other practical issues concerning the visit to Naantali.

Eija Mäenpää met the board of parents' association on 24 October and 26 November 2018 to introduce Roots project to them and to involve parents' association in the planning and carrying out the activities of the project. Parents' association considered the project vital for students' understanding of different cultures and personal growth.

When the preliminary program had been established, Roots team started to work with the students chosen into this project (below).



The group had altogether 7 workshops (21 September, 28 September, 31 October, 16 November, 28 November, 4 December and 10 December) in which they worked on the themes of the first project to be carried out in Naantali. All students were given responsibilities for the coming project meeting and they worked on their tasks independently between the workshops. Some of them interviewed old people about folk stories and made a PowerPoint and video of the results. Some made a presentation on the Finnish school system and Naantali Upper Secondary School. Some made a video of Finnish food, some prepared program for the Christmas party during the meeting, some made a PowerPoint of Finnish Christmas traditions, some made a logo for the project and some made a Christmas card for the participating schools. Students were encouraged to use their imagination and to explore different ways and means to gather and process information in order to present it as effectively and clearly as possible in the project meeting. All practical issues concerning the timetable, hosting arrangements etc. were also discussed in the workshops.

Roots team arranged a meeting on 19 November with the families that were to host the international students during the project meeting in Naantali 12 - 19 December 2018. There was a presentation about the general contents of the project and the program of the project meeting was introduced. There were also many practical issues that were agreed on in the meeting.

Wednesday 12 December

On Wednesday we went to pick our guest up from Hotel Palo. The car ride to the hotel was really exciting, because we had only talked to our guest on the internet and now was the time to meet them.

Thursday 13 December

Friday 14 December

We started the day by listening to all the students tell about their countries' folk stories which were all really impressive. After lunch we started to prepare some performances of all countries folk stories that we would show to everyone on Tuesday. We did that in little groups and we got to design it in every way we wanted to. In the evening all of the Roots projects members met in a restaurant called Metsätähti were we had our Christmas party. We ate amazing food, we had a quiz about Finland, magic tricks and even Santa came see us and brought all of us Christmas gifts! After the Christmas party we seperated and we went to hang out in smaller groups. Me and my friend went to Lotta's house. We danced like crazy and played some truth or dare. The whole evening was unbelievable and I think it was the first thing that brought us closer together.

Saturday 15 December

On Saturday we went to Turku. We visited the Cathedral of Turku and the Turku castle. After that we got to go on our own to the Christmas market. During the day me and some of my friends went shopping and of course we took them in to a little shop so that they could buy something to remind them of Finland. We actually got Nicholas to buy tar soap. That night me and Karoliina and our Czech guests went to my grand mother's house to go to sauna and swimming.

Sunday 16 December



At 10 in the morning we pulled warm clothes on and headed for the nature trail of Haijainen. We walked the nature trail to a beautiful laavu which brought a lot of good memories at least for me bacause a hadn't visited that place since I was a little kid. We wondered around in the forest, barbequed sausages and stick buns. The nature was so peaceful and refreshing. Some of us played tag and few people got their shoes wet because we were jumping around a swamp. But the atmosphere was so good that a few pairs of wet shoes didn't ruin our fun! In the afternoon we joined the Christmas carols in Naantali church.

Monday 17 December

After an awesome weekend we returned to school and started our morning with presentations about all the coutries' cuisines. We got to taste amazing new flavors and especially the Turkish food made an impression on me, because I have never tasted anything similar to that.





After eating lunch, we made some art. We had recycled materials and our assignment was to make something to reflect the upcoming year or the future. The groups had made pieces involving the global warming, pollutions, the bad effect of media and how we could solve these problems. The local newspaper made an article about this art workshop and the project in general. The last activity was to go to Naantali Museum where we made some traditional Finnish Christmas decorations. From the museum we went and played the Amazing race. There we got clues about some important locations in Naantali that we were supposed to find with little groups and pose for a photo in the specific place. The best group photo was awarded on Tuesday. In the evening some of us went to watch Naantali figureskating teams' Christmas show. Everyone got to go to the ice after the performances. There were students skating from Italy, Cyprus, Spain, the Czech Republic and of course some of us, the Finnish students. Some of the students were skating for the first time and all of them got better with every slide. From skating we went to Lotta's family's beach house with a little group where we went to sauna and also into the freezing sea! It was a perfect last night with the most Finnish thing that there is - sauna and the cold water! Some of the other group members had a movie night at Jade's place and they watched a scary movie together.

Tuesday 18 December

When we came to school on Tuesday, we started to search photos from the past week and we wrote things that we saw, experienced and how we felt. In the afternoon we presented our folk stories. 




Our school: Lykeio Polemidion, Limassol, CYPRUS

At the beginning of **September** we announced to all our students of the first and the second grade the inception of the Erasmus+ Project "Roots". We explained them, all about this project (content, aim, duties, the countries taking part etc.). The students were very enthusiastic in taking part in this Project and the final selection was made after interviewing them. The students, who were chosen, were Andreas Massou, Nicolas Hatzichristou, Elena Christou, Michalis Iakovides, Andreas Georgiou, Georgia Quinton, Tasos Anastasiou, Chrisostomos Pozatos, Myrianthi Vasiliou, Nicol Charalambous, Maria Georgiou, Maria Vasiliou, Maria Ioannou, Christos Chatzimiltis, Michalis Socratous and George Christofi. The teachers, also taking part in this project are Marina Georgiadou as the coordinator of the Project, Christina Ellina, Panayiotis Karakatsianis, Nicolas Genethliou and Andreas Petrou.

In **October** the logo competition was announced and 2 of the drawings that were chosen took part at the final competition in Finland between the partners' countries.

These drawings were made by Niki Avraam and Iraklis Constantinou.





At the end of **October** our students who were going to take part on the first mobility begun to work on the first project "Folks, Stories, Narrations". They also made interviews with elder people about folk stories they used to hear in their childhood.

On the 3rd of **November** the coordinator of the project Marina Georgiadou attended a seminar/workshop "Refugees, Migrants: pedagogical approach" which was organized by the UNHCR and the Pedagogical Institute of Cyprus. During this seminar, Marina Georgiadou made contact with different people for the organization of the second mobility which will take place from the 22nd to 29th of January 2019 in Cyprus on the subject of immigration.

Moreover, the students began the preparation of a questionnaire on the same subject and the final one was sent to the partners.

On the 4th of December, students of the 1st grade visited the Kourion Amphitheatre and the ancient mosaics in Paphos, an important part of the Paphos Archaeological Park, a World Heritage Site(under the protection of UNESCO)





Emigration

During the English lesson in the second and third class of Lyceum the pupils worked on articles dealt with different aspects of immigration.

They read texts, articles from the newspapers, poems and lyrics related to the subject. They found reasons of emigration, how the immigrants feel and how the native people face them.

The pupils tried to understand their difficulties, their hard conditions of life and found solutions on the problem.

This way the pupils got used to cooperating with them and acquiring empathy. They also had the will and sensitivity to help them become full members of the local community.

On the 12th of December we finally had our first meeting in Naantali Finland where we met our new partners from Finland, Turkey, Czech Republic, Spain and Italy.

The meeting was very well organized, and the hospitality was great. We learned about the Finnish educational system, traditions and habits. We visited very interesting places and the most important, we made new friends.

Italian team activities

The first project meeting of the Erasmus+ project "Roots" was held in Naantali (Finland) from Dec 13th to 19th 2018.

The preparation activity for this project at the Instituto Alberghiero "Karol Wojtyla" started in late summer with the exchange of email messages between the local teachers involved in the project and the European Partners in order to fix the dates of the various meetings according to the availability and engagements of each group. Once the dates were confirmed, local planning started with the selection of the students involved in this meeting and the planning of the activities foreseen in the general program of the project as well as to make travel plans.

A meeting between the Italian project coordinator and other colleagues involved in the project, took place to plan some activities for the first meeting as well as some dissemination actions with students, parents and colleagues of other schools. The presentation of the project was launched on the school web site where the project was illustrated with its main features and purposes.

A student selection process started in the 5th year classes, chosen as being part to the first phase of this projects. Selection criteria to choose students were their individual interest on the project, their level of English competences reached and their good behaviour during school activities. Three students from a 5th year class of the Enogastronomy section were chosen to take part to the project. Teachers met the students' parents in order to illustrate the project, get the necessary authorization and get them involved in the project.

According to the program established for the meeting, the work focused on the knowledge of cultural heritage through traditions, folk stories, legends and traditional cuisine. The teachers/students team planned the first activities based on the collection of some interviews to grannies and other aged people to find out which stories were most popular during their childhood and what the aim of these stories was. In the same time all students of the class involved in the project started to carry out an internet research on the most popular stories. Some students went around the town to take pictures of monuments and other interesting features, others started to prepare the official logo of the project and others took some interviews.

For the traditional cuisine, students produced a video showing the preparation of typical desserts such as the cannolo, while other desserts like the martorana fruit, the buccellati and the cassata were

shown in a power point presentation. The whole class was involved in the research and preparation of the material.

These activities provided students the opportunity to improve social and communication skills, creativity, environmental awareness and boost entrepreneurship concepts.

In the meantime the project was launched on the eTwinning platform.

Between 12th and 19th December the first international meeting with students and teachers was held at the Naantali High School in Finland under the Erasmus + project "Roots". Students had to develop social and personal abilities within a team, to actively suggest and accept opinions of others in order to fulfill the main issue of this teamwork: raising awareness of the importance of cultural heritage as the basis of knowledge and acceptance of other cultures.

We left Catania on the 11th of December at 13.05 and got to Berlin in the afternoon. After a short visit to Alexander platz and to the Christmas market, where we had some typical hot dog for dinner, we went back to the hotel. The following day we flew to Helsinki and later, by bus, we reached Turku and then Naantali. The travel was quite long but exciting. When we got Naantali, in the afternoon, the Principal of the High School and the hosting students were waiting for us at the bus station. We were all very excited and very very happy.

On December 13^{th,} we had a warm welcome at the Naantali high school by the principal and other teacher while Saint Lucia's chorus sang traditional songs. We were introduced to the Finnish school system and to the main topic of the survey that was the old stories and legends of each country. Thirteen students from six European countries Finland, Czech Republic, Turkey, Spain, Italy and Cyprus illustrated the results of their survey on the above topics.

In the following days, we completed the tour of Turku, the old capital town of Finland with its cathedral and castle, the campfire in the forest, the historical center of Naantali and assisted to the Christmas carols at Naantali church.

The last day was very sad and our visit ended with great hugs.

We will meet again another 5 times in two years to explore other issues related to our cultural background and discover what's similar and what's different among our cultures.

Our activities:

October - We presented the project to the students and teachers and shared the most important information on the school walls. We established the school team to start the preparations for the 1st project meeting in Naantali, Finland. We had a competition in the school to choose the best three logos for the project logo competition. The project team had meetings with the local administrations, shared information with them, then prepared the promotional materials.

November – We completed all the workshops, the stories of legends in Turkey, and shot the videos. Then we chose the participants to join the project meeting in Finland according to the best prepared logos, best shot videos and best story of legends.



And then we started! December;

The main topics of the meeting were folk stories, narrations and theatre. We arrived in Naantali on December 12th and welcomed by the school project team. Next day, we all met at the school where the main ideas, aims, and methods were presented. After the welcome speech by the school headmistress, Eija Maenpaa, the Finnish team presented the school and the education system in their country. Then all partners presented their schools and towns so that everybody could learn more about them.

In the afternoon, the Project Logo Competition was held. All participants starting voting for the logos which were taken to the meeting from their schools to choose the best logo. At the end of the last project day, our logo prepared by our project team was chosen as the Roots Project Logo.

Students went into the classes and learned something about the Finnish lesson / class system. Meanwhile the teachers discussed all the details of the project and agreed on our next steps in the project.





During the workshops and activities at school, we had our lunches at the school restaurant. This was one of the most surprising things for us because we learned that

the lunches for the students were free. The other thing which was different from our system was that there were no school bells between the lessons. Our teachers went into the some lessons and had some chats with the teachers, discussed the similarities and differences between the countries.

During the history of legends, our students presented their videos which was about the well famous legendary "Köroğlu". This video was the interviews with their grandfathers and grandmothers taken by the students themselves about Köroğlu.





The other topic by our team was "Kerem ile Aslı". This was made as a role-play by the international teams.

Next day, there was the "National Cuisine", which was one of the most popular activities of the project! All the partners prepared their tables with some traditional sweets, meals, snacks or drinks and decorated them with their flags.

However, it was good to get to know each other more and have some fun together. Therefore, after we completed our daily activities, we went to the Old Naantali Town, museum, harbour and some sightseeings in the town centre to learn about the history and culture of Naantali.





On Dec. 19th, we completed our project meeting and started our journey way back to our city. When we returned to Helsinki, we had a sightseeing in Helsinki together with the Czech team.

At the beginning of January, we had a dissemination activity at the neighbouring school, Özel Güney Anadolu Lisesi and we explained the workshops, activities, results of the project and we sha

What do I think and feel about Finland

On my way to Finland i was very excited. It was my first time travelling to a new country and i didn't have a single clue about what to expect. I knew a little about their cultures and i knew they also knew so little about me. But when i first met with my host parents, i felt like i already knew them. They were so genuine and caring through my whole visit i never felt like a foreigner. Their culture was very different than ours, mostly shaped by their climate and surroundings. For example ice sports like skiing and ice hockey are very popular in Finland. Their cuisine is based on fish and things they find in Finland. Most of

the Finns know the name and properties of plants in Finland. For example they will mostly know whether a mushroom is poisonous or not. Their early education is full of useful informations to be later used in life. After that, Finns are lectured to be a contributing person to the society, each person can go after their goals and interest and decide in a career considering their abilities. I think the key for their successful education system is the freedom, the freedom to learn, the freedom to be. Finns can specialize in subjects they want to learn. Later on, they get exams not about things they have to remember, but about things they actually learn. Exams are done on the person's school without strict rules. In Turkey, it is mostly done with under stressful conditions which often leads them to panic and fail the exam and if possible, a regular student is very likely to cheat. Finnish education system does not have classes based on the students age but it does have lessons. There are some mandatory lessons a student has to take but to take more lessons are up to the student. They can decide what they want to learn. And also the school books do not look like regular school books, they are especially designed to attract attention and i found that pretty nice. The people in Finland, as i have observed, don't seem to talk to you unless you do the first move. The architecture in Finland is very neoclassical, it has sharp edges and high contrast and it looks good (in my opinion). The population is not very large with low density per people so most of people has their own estate. Because Finland has been under Sweden's controle for about a hundred years, the culture of Finns are very similiar to Swedes. And Swedish is one of the official languages of the country. The Finnish language comes from the same language tree from Turkish and has a lot of postpositions and declining, so it is not that hard for a Turkish speaking person to learn Finnish as it would be for an English or German speaking person.
