



My name is Adéla and I want to write to you something about how I usually spend the autumn in my country. In the Czech Republic summer holidays end by the end of August that means for us we have to go back to school and even if the weather might still be warm, the autumn finally starts. I like autumn a lot because it is still sunny and the nature is full of beautiful colours. During this season we have lots of traditions and I want to write you about some of them.

All Souls' Day falls on November 2nd. The official Czech name is *Památka zesnulých* ("a remembrance of those who have passed"), but everyone calls the day *dušičky* ("little souls" or "of all saints"). People sometimes compare this old tradition to Halloween, but the two don't have much in common. *Dušičky* is a quiet time in the Czech Republic. We visit the graves of family members and relatives to lit candles, lay flowers and wreaths and spend a few moments. Even it usually very sad the flickering glow of hundreds of freshly lit candles makes the atmosphere at cemeteries during *dušičky* time quite beautiful.



Much funnier for everybody is the parade with lanterns which is held in our village every year. The weather is usually chilly or rainy, but it doesn't prevent us from observing the tradition. Adults dress up as ghosts and scare children. Kids have to follow the route, and when they get to the end, they get sweets. I always follow that route with my friends and it is really enjoyable and exciting.



In every autumn we enjoy typical activities. My favourite is picking mushrooms. I like to go to the forest for mushrooms in the fall. They mostly grow during September-October.



When I was younger I used to make my own kite and fly it running on the field, because the autumn winds are great for flying kites - by the way in Czech we call it dragon, what do you call it in your language? According to the legend the kites were making connection between humans and God, and they were supposed to scare the enemy. Later on, the kites were used by farmers to bring them a rich harvest. If you interested in this activity and you have never tried it before, you should make one and enjoy the flying season.

If it is damp and mushrooms grow, we go to the forest and collect them. The nature looks amazing because the leaves turn





It is the feast day of St. Wenceslas, the patron saint of Bohemia, and commemorates his death in 935. Also known as 'Czech Statehood Day', it is a national holiday in the Czech Republic and has been a public holiday since 2000. Wenceslas was born in 907 and was the son of the Duke of Bohemia. His father died in 921 and Wenceslas ruled from 922, when he was 15. The reign of Wenceslas is marked by his support of the church, his aim to unify Bohemia and make peace with Germany. These policies



created enemies within his court and even his family. Wenceslas was attacked by his own brother Boleslav and killed. Having suffered a martyr's death, Wenceslas was immediately considered a saint. I am really proud about the Czech history what about you, what's your favourite subject?

History and traditions have lots of in common and they are both important for our country and that 's why I like Czech customs. In autumn lantern parade takes place in our village even if its' history is a bit more political. Nowadays it is a sweet tradition that sees groups of families, schoolmates, and entire communities lighting up the autumn night with assorted paper creations shaped like everything. 
