

- ask a question:

- use a **quote**:

- describe a situation/ scenario:

• Every morning, millions of teenagers all over the world spend an endless amount of time...

- state an interesting fact or statistic:

• Young people aged between 16 and 24 spend more than 27 hours a week on the internet.

[what NOT to do: announce what you are going to do (→bo-o-oring): *<u>I am going to explain...</u>*]
