Of course, you can keep an online logbook.

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### Wednesday, 3rd October 2018

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### Thursday, 4<sup>th</sup> October 2018

On Thursday, we were welcomed in the Läfte Gymnasium and listened to very nice musical acts from Estonian singers and a choir. Then we presented how our country deals with the production of energy and were then divided into 4 groups, in which we would work together for the next week. Later we got to know each other a little, before we ate lunch the local students gave us a brief tour of their school buildings. In the afternoon, we visited the Estonian university of life sciences and got to see with which methods the building is powered, be it by solar or wind power or by burning wood.

In the evening, some of us went ice skating and had a lot of fun together, although we may have crashed once or twice.



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### Friday, 5<sup>th</sup> October 2018

On Friday we first visited Tartu and briefly went inside its university. The mayor of Tartu, Mr. Urmas Klaas then welcomed us in the Town Hall and spoke about the importance of the city of Tartu for the central Baltics.

We had lunch at the Gunpowder Cellar and drove to the Tartu Environmental Education Centre, later to the Ice Age Centre and in the evening to the Tartu AHHA Science Centre, where we could experiment with very interesting scientific phenomena.



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### Saturday, 6<sup>th</sup> October 2018

On Saturday we got up early in the morning and set off to Tallinn, the capital of Estonia. After we arrived there, we got a small tour through the city, conveniently from inside our bus, because it was raining.

Nevertheless we were able to have a look at the Tallinn Song festival grounds and the Kadriorg castle. After lunch time, we visited the Energy Discovery Centre and saw a very interesting demonstration of the Faraday cage. Then, we luckily had the chance to visit the old town of Tallinn and wandered through the narrow streets next to many beautiful little shops.

On Sunday we roamed through the beautiful nature of Estonia. After sleeping in, we drove to the Meenikunno Bog Reserve in the south of Estonia. In the evening, after eating dinner in Tartu, we spend our time at the hotel with the other foreign students as usual and later tried out the sauna of the hotel.
