Much, many with a noun

We use *much* with uncountable nouns and *many* with plural countable nouns:Usually in questions and negative sentences.

I haven't got much money.

Are there **many** houses near you?

In informal styles, we prefer to use *a lot of* in affirmative sentences for uncountable and for countable nouns

I went shopping and spent a lot of money.

There are a lot of houses near me.

We use *little* with uncountable nouns. We use *few* with plural countable nouns.

I have little sugar in my coffee.

We had snow last winter.

- She hasfriends.
- There iswater in the pond.
