'I grew up in London where I completed my first degree in bookbinding and was the third generation of women in my family to go to art college. I then worked for two libraries, two bookshops, two art galleries and two universities, and was busily pursuing a career in the art world before writing overtook everything. In 2008, after the death of one grandmother and the decline of the other, I began to explore the idea of dementia in fiction, and I moved to Norwich in 2010 to study for an MA in Creative Writing.'

Maud's been getting forgetful. She keeps buying peach slices when she has a cupboard full, forgets to drink the cups of tea she's made and writes notes to remind herself of things. But Maud is determined to discover what has happened to her friend, Elizabeth, and what it has to do with the unsolved disappearance of her sister Sukey just after the Second World War.

The story starts where we meet Maud, an aging grandmother with dementia who is slowly losing her memory and her grip on everyday life. She refuses to forget her best friend Elizabeth, who she is convinced is missing and in terrible danger. Equipped with handwritten notes she leaves for herself and an overwhelming feeling that Elizabeth needs her help, Maud resolves to discover the truth and save her beloved friend but no one will listen to Maud - not her frustrated daughter, Helen, not her caretakers, not the police, and especially not Elizabeth's temperamental son, Peter.

This story is set in two time frames - Maud's past and the present day. The singular obsession of Maud finding Elizabeth forms a cornerstone of Maud's rapidly dissolving present. But the clues she discovers seem only to lead her deeper into her past, to another unsolved disappearance: her sister, Sukey, who vanished shortly after World War II.

As vivid memories of a tragedy that occurred more fifty years ago come flooding back, Maud discovers new momentum in her search for her friend. Could the mystery of Sukey's disappearance hold the key to finding Elizabeth?

I really could not say that I "enjoyed" reading this book, as the subject matter was too near the bone for me at times. My mother had Alzheimer's & now my MIL is going down the same route. I found some of the things Maud says & does were so like some of the experiences we had (& are having) with our mothers. However having said that, I could not put this book down. It was fascinating seeing all the confusion from the other side of the fence, as it were & I had tears in my eyes several times as I realised just how scary all the experiences must have been for my mother. I say a huge "bravo" to Emma Healey for her so accurate descriptions of the confused old lady...& her loved ones who struggle hard to look after her & keep her safe - not always an easy job. Do read this book...especially if you are dealing with anyone who is suffering from memory loss or Alzheimer's.

I am so impressed with this new author's ability to portray the travails of dementia, both from the main character's viewpoint (who is suffering from the onset of dementia) and her family's viewpoint. The dual mysteries of a present and a past disappearance are revealed through the veil of forgetfulness, and the actions of other characters. Having been through this with my own mother, I thought it was extremely realistic, and the "repetitive" parts that other readers have mentioned simply illustrate the repetitive nature of someone with dementia.

At one level, this is a murder mystery that never gets solved. But it is really a journey into the mind of one who suffers from dementia. That may be frightening to those concerned about their own future mental health, which may include most of us, but it is a journey worth taking. My central question in reading this novel was how the author can know what is in the mind of the dementia sufferer. The answer is that she cannot, but this description feels right, as right as I can imagine one can get. The fact that nothing gets resolved in this novel may be disturbing to some, but that is the essence of life, with or without dementia.
