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
HIGHERYOUTH TOUR

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UNITED IN DIVERSITY AT KING'S







United in Diversity is the name of our newly funded Erasmus + project which has been awarded to King's by the European Commission and which is officially launched today. The project will focus on Languages, creative use of ICT and the exploration of heritage in the case of France, Spain and Britain. We will be working closely with our partner schools IES Andrés Vandelvira (Albacete, Spain) and College Chaloupe Saint Leu (Saint Leu, La Reunion) throughout this academic year.

The aim of the project is to explore heritage, develop cultural awareness and social interaction in order to create a real context to enhance our students' language skills. The project will involve two exchange trips to La Reunion and Spain together with a series of tasks carried out in school by all participants, where the use of ICT will be vital and enhanced at all times. Some of the activities in which students will have the opportunity to participate, will be creating videos, interactive presentations and using Skype, all via the use of French and Spanish! Working collaboratively with our partners' schools will be key for the success of the project. Finally, students from all countries will work at King's Ely on the design and creation of a promotional, multilingual video celebrating the heritage of all countries involved in the project in the context of Europe.

This Erasmus project will be completely funded by the European Commission and we are honoured to offer this amazing opportunity to 20 Year 9 and 10 students. The project pinpoints the MFL department big ethos of "taking languages outside the classroom, please!"

In MFL, we have an exciting extracurricular year ahead bursting with opportunities for all our students, such as this Erasmus project, drama and debating competitions, business workshops and MFL plays with the purpose to create unique contexts for our students at King's to put their linguistic skills into practice at all levels!



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Ruta Quetzal BBVA is an "initiatory," "enlightened" and "scientific" program in which culture and adventure come together. Thanks to this program, young people from all over the world have the opportunity to discover the human, geographic and historical dimensions of other cultures. 
The 1st team travelled away to Wellingborough on Tuesday. This match was to be one of the toughest they have played so far.
