












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EPQ STUDENTS

It focuses on enhancing the talent of Young Fashion Designers to showcase and promote the exceptional work achieved by A Level students studying fashion and textile design throughout the United Kingdom.

Anna Pearce was through to the final eight A level entries and after a series of presentations was awarded second place. She entered two beautiful jacket designs using digital transfer techniques and gathering and layering effects on a

woven structure. The sculptural aspects have been an integral part of her design work and have created highly individual outcomes.

The judges made reference to the photographs she had taken of the garment and how they had 'brought the piece alive'. Also, the fashion illustrations that she prepared to support the design process. Two of the judges commented on what a 'stunning' and 'outstanding' textile piece she had created. Another judge told Anna that the final decision had been incredibly close and that there was a 'hairs breadth' between first and second prize.

Last week something unique happened at King's Ely: 60 students from La Reunion, Albacete, Spain and King's Ely, met in our school to complete the last activities and tasks from our big Erasmus Plus Project, which we proudly started last October. It has been a great year and the students involved in the project have certainly worked hard. We have worked collaboratively among the three countries in many virtual activities and, of course, in face to face tasks during our trips. Last week it was the opportunity for everyone to meet up together and work in mixed nationality teams in our last tasks: the creation of some Heritage Videos and a leaflet promoting diversity.

The aim of the project and certainly last week, was to present students with the opportunity to make decisions, to communicate and work as a team in an international context: our three nationalities! These are all skills that our kids will need in their futures and we feel privileged to be given the educational opportunity to develop these at this early age in a real situation.

The week was also packed with fun activities for students to discover our British heritage, as we discovered that of La Reunion and Spain early in the year, while having fun among all of us. It has been magical to see how students were trying to communicate in three languages while forging friendships, after all, as the Albacete team moto said in their project, WE SMILE IN THE SAME LANGUAGE!

I am so proud of all of our children and their guests.

The whole week I have been reflecting not only on how good this project has been to promote international relationships but also, from a MFL pedagogical point of view, on how good this experience has been to allow all students to practise those skills taught in lessons for real. This is vital in education, as all recent research states that it is subconsciously that we learn a language the best. This experience has also been life changing for our guests from La Reunion, for some of whom this has been one of the few opportunities they will ever have to visit mainland Europe.

I must thank also, the Erasmus team at King's, in Spain and La Reunion for their hard work and commitment, as this has been a three way team effort. A huge thank you too to our wonderful King's families for hosting all of our guests.

Finally, very well done to Team Toulouse who were the overall winners of our Media Project competition, followed closely by Teams Albacete and Saint Leu. For me you are all winners. 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BATTLEFIELDS 2019













Our annual Battlefields trip for Year 9 students left Ely at 06.00 on Friday 21 June. After briefly stopping at Maidstone to pick up our guide we were quickly on the Eurotunnel heading toward France. Day one was spent on the Franco-Belgian border discussing the outbreak of WW I at several significant places such as Gheluveldt, Polygon Wood and the Hooge Crater Museuem. At the last of these students learnt about weaponry and battlefield casualty treatment before heading to our hotel for fish and chips and some welldeserved rest. An early start on Day 2 enabled us to get to the Somme to begin a full day of battlefront touring. Commencing in Newfoundland Park we then began our front-line walk from Montauban to Delville Wood and then High Wood, learning about the introduction of the tank and the tactical use of cavalry. We ended the day at Thiepval, paying our respects to Old Eleans and other relatives remembered on this iconic landmark. Day 3 again took us to France, this time the area surrounding Arras, including Vimy Ridge, Neuville St Vaast German Cemetery and our frontline walk from Monchy Cemetery towards Infantry Hill. In the afternoon we visited the museum where Deborah the tank is housed before driving back to Ypres for the Menin Gate Last Post Ceremony where two of our students laid a wreath on behalf of the school. On our final day we started at Tyne Cot Cemetery just outside the village of Passendale before walking along the high ground to Ploegsteert Cemetery where we visited the adjoining graves of two soldiers; one aged 14 and the other 47. In the balmy heat of Ypres students enjoyed their last packed lunch followed by some free time to explore the town. We rounded off our 2019 tour with a visit to Langemarck; another German Cemetery which was visited by Hitler early in the Second World War and in many ways brought us full circle to where we started on Friday.

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With 41 students this was our biggest trip for several years, despite the heat, the occasional blister and the odd moan and groan all students had an amazing time and will no doubt have their own personal memories for years to come. My thanks, as ever, to Mrs Jackson, Mr Currie and Miss Riley for marshalling and encouraging our troops. To the catering team who ensured this army could march on with a full stomach, and to you the parents for supporting the Battlefields. Finally, the students who did us all proud with the way they conducted themselves, especially at the Menin Gate.






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UGLY YOUTH REHEARSALS



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YEAR 12 BIOLOGY STUDENTS

Today a group of four Year 12 Biology students visited Isle of Ely Primary School, along with Mrs Stewart and Mrs Marshall (our Biology technician) to run a 30 minute lesson on digestion in each of the three year 3/4 mixed classes. Armed with an almost-lifesize model with removable organs, an elephant molar, a sheep skull, and all kinds of messy chemicals, the students led the children through the story of ingestion (eating), digestion and egestion (releasing waste). The children particularly enjoyed seeing the process of digestion acted out in a series of chemical reactions, using coco pops and a banana as the food stuff, and resulting in a rather messy end product. They were also amazed by the piece of string representing the small intestine (7 metres!), and Lachlan's favourite fact- that it is possible to swallow food whilst standing on your head due to the action of peristalsis. This was a great opportunity to visit one of our partner schools, and share our love of science with a very enthusiastic audience. Special thanks to Mrs Marshall for making up all of the chemical solutions, and cleaning up all of the mess, and to Lachlan Cook, Jing Cen, Anna Chaudhry and Charlotte Hamilton-Bing who led the sessions.

After lunch, the students together with the teachers attended a talk by Dr Colin Wright about juggling and the Maths behind it. Even though the talk features juggling, the presentation was really about Science and Mathematics, how they work, what they mean, and why they're important. The talk has

been given in locations as diverse as New Zealand, Australia, Sweden, Norway, Finland, Chicago, Seattle, Atlanta, Washington, Vancouver, Belgium, France, The Netherlands, Ireland, The Isle of Man, China, Brunei, and all over mainland UK.

Both teachers and students listened and were fascinated to see some juggling with five juggling balls. It was a fantastic day and was thoroughly enjoyed by all students involved.
