ERASMUS

What an amazing experience our students had as part of the Erasmus trip to Albacete! In an atmosphere, recently, where the status of languages' uptake is being questioned all across the UK, here, at King's Ely, as our Head of German pointed out two weeks ago, languages are strong! How can that be? Because we are not just teaching languages, we are taking the languages outside the classroom by making



experiences! In order to do that, we offer a rich extracurricular programme in the

MFL department and also we work, where possible, with projects involving our partner schools links. This year, we have focussed on our Erasmus project, United in Diversity, which is being a great success not only to develop our students' French and Spanish skills, but also their cultural language and their ability to collaborate on a global environment, all key skills for our



youngsters' future.

Last Wednesday 6 March we embarked on this second Erasmus trip to Albacete, Spain. Students participated in a great number of activities, from delivering presentations in Spanish and English about their culture and heritage, working on a collaborative blog diary via Padlet to taking part in a wide range of cultural activities and excursions.



Day 1 students enjoyed a nice walk around Albacete as they visited the local Cathedral, the Museum of cultlery and had Chocolate con Churros.





Day 2 was the highlight of the week as students got ready in the morning for their participation in the Carnival Parade: students worked on the parade choreography and finished the decoration of our outfits. Finally, as anticipation started rising, we were driven to the local village of Villarrobledo and started enjoying the festival of



the Carnival! After a couple of hours of anticipation, dancing to music in the big Village Main Square, we eventually joined the Carnival Parade dressed as flags: UK, Spain, France and the EU, representing the three countries carrying out our Erasmus project and the European spirit that has made all this possible! There are no words to describe the students' feelings while in the parade apart from being una experiencia inolvidable! It was beautiful to see how students from both countries mixed together dancing, singing, enjoying and taking part in the Spanish culture



while experiencing a whole community coming together with the carnival just before the Lent period!



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Days 3 and 4 were spent with host families enjoying the gastronomy and the historical heritage of the Albacete province as parents organised local trips to close by key villages.



Day 5 we went to Toledo in order to experience the cultural and historical heritage of Spain and find out about El Greco, one of Spain's most famous and talented painters. On the way back to Albacete, we also stopped to see the Consuegra mills described in the well known Don Quijote's passage of the fight of the three giants!





Day 6 students enjoyed the geographical heritage of the area in Las Lagunas de Ruidera, where they also took part in water activities in the lakes and visited the Cueva de Montesinos, again, featured in Don Quijote's adventures with her maiden La Doncella del Toboso.





What a week! I certainly was emotional to see how experiences were created, how students worked collaboratively in their Padlets throughout the week and how they were communicating in Spanish, while understanding more than a language, that any app can translate, but a culture, its people, its traditions and therefore, developing our students' tolerance and critical thinking. We were truly United in diversity!

I must give a big thank you to Mr Kishor, who accompanied us on the trip and the Spanish teachers and Spanish SMT who went through a great effort to organize all activities, especially the Carnival. Also, Muchas Gracias to all the Spanish families,

who created the Carnival outfits for us and were such wonderful hosts to our students, you have all contributed to a life changing experience!

ROYAL BOTANIC GARDENS YEAR 13

Year 13 Geographers had an exciting and informative day at the Royal Botanic Gardens, Kew, last Thursday.

They were partaking in two curriculum sessions, the first on Globalisation. This involved students considering the positives and negatives globalisation poses for all stakeholders involved, with a focus on produce used globally that originates from the world's rainforests.

Students then faced an unusual scavenger hunt to find three rainforest raw materials within the Palm House and using these, design a sustainable, fair trade, global product that met a 'triple bottom line' of People, Planet, Profit. A great deal of thought and innovation went into the creation of the products with some extremely interesting and surprisingly marketable results!







After lunch the students worked on their second session on Water and Carbon Cycles. This was introduced with a team building recap on both cycles followed by discussion on human interruptions and impacts. Back in the Palm House, students worked to identify and geolocate plant species emulating the work carried out by the RSPB on their Harapan Rainforest Reserve. They considered the impacts of growing rainforest species commercially and the effects this has on the water and carbon cycles.

A thoroughly enjoyable and educational day was had by all, the highlight for some being the discovery of the rare Jade Vine in the orchid house! Many thanks to Mrs Keen for accompanying us and for your interest and enthusiasm in the visit.

A Waste of a Week





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FOOTBALL

First XI made it eight wins in a row with a fine display at Oakham

The first XI put in a tremendous first half display against Oakham who were level top of the Mercian League with King's. From the kick off King's dominated possession and the tempo of the match with Callum Hall and Robbie Robjant controlling the game from the middle of the park. Alistair MacArthur opened the scoring following neat interplay down the right flank. Our second goal was probably the best team goal that I have ever seen at first team level. Tom Kim gathered the ball under pressure next to the corner flag. He calmly passed the ball out of defence. This started a series of eight passes which culminated in Arthur Plews slotting home from ten yards. Plews grabbed his second ten minutes into the second half when he outpaced the



Oakham defence and riffled passed the Oakham keeper from the edge of the box. This was his eighteenth goal of the term and set a new King's scoring record. King's went on to record a three one victory and currently sit top of the Mercian league with three games to go. We will also return to Oakham next week to contest the LB Cup semi-final.

The 2nd team went down 3-0 in a hard fought match. The third team played out entertaining 12 goal thriller eventually losing 7-5. The goal scorers were S George-Grajales (2), T Savko, D Zhawi and an own goal. The fourth XI continued their unbeaten record with C Boyle completing a brace and scoring in the final minute. Players worthy of a special mention were goalkeeper Louis Ahmed, Charlie Boyle and Billy McGrath.

At home the Under 14 A Team put in their best display of the season against Oakham under 15 A, when they recorded an 8-1 victory. In this match the team played some slick attacking football with delightful interplay between defence, midfield and attack. The goal scorers were W Daniel (2), C Henry (2), H Hall (2), C Marshall and T Coates.



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On Tuesday three Under 15 teams travelled to Haileybury. All matches were competitive and we were extremely unlucky not to come away with a victory. The A team put in a tremendous performance in an evenly fought encounter. Haileybury were awarded a last minute penalty which they converted to seal a 4-3 victory. King's goalscorers were Harry Hall (2) and Archie Hall. The B team also had a cracker of a match, which ended in a 3-2; defeat goal scorers were George Chamberlain and David Keene. The U 15 C team played their first match and thoroughly enjoyed the match. We don't often field a C team at this level but it is great to see the enthusiasm and desire to represent the school at this level. Unfortunately the C team lost 5-1 but put in a spirited display. Goal scorer was Oliver Gee.

This weekend we play eight fixtures against Wellingborough with an 11 o'clock kick off. The seniors travel whilst the U15A and B and U14A and B host.
