It's very "popular", in Euskadi. It's the most important. In Spain is very famous, too. It's situated in the capital of Euskadi. (Basque country)



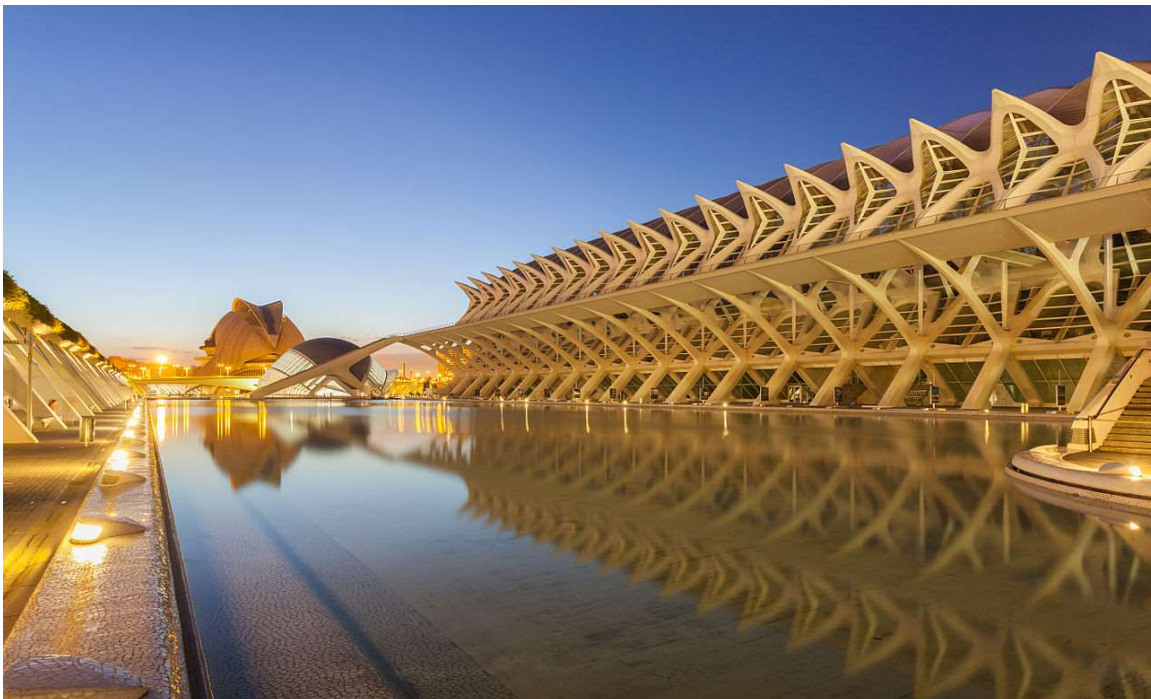
[2. Museu Nacional d'Art de Catalunya](#)

3. Museo de las Ciencias y las Artes Príncipe Felipe

The Príncipe Felipe Science Museum, a Spanish museum dedicated to science, technology and the environment, is part of the complex known as the City of Arts and Sciences of the city of Valencia, (Spain). Open to the public on November 13, 2000, it has a total of 26,000 m² of exhibitions. It has several floors of temporary and permanent exhibitions. It also has large classrooms and terraces, both indoor and outdoor, which are used for conducting workshops and activities. It has also been the site of different social and cultural events in the city. Its vocation is to promote interest in scientific and technological knowledge through fun and entertainment. With this objective, great importance is attached to the interactivity of the exhibitions (their motto is "Forbidden not to touch, not to feel, not to think").



4. Museo del Prado

5. The National Museum of Anthropology

The National Museum of Anthropology (in Spanish: Museo Nacional de Antropología) is a national museum of Spain, located in Madrid near the Parque del Buen Retiro and opposite Atocha railway and metro station. It is considered the oldest anthropology museum in Spain, formally inaugurated on April 29, 1875, during the reign of Alfonso XII.



6. CosmoCaixa

CosmoCaixa is a science museum located in Barcelona, Catalonia, Spain. Formerly known as the Science Museum of Barcelona, it closed for renovations in 1998 and reopened in 2004 under its current name. The museum features a variety of exhibitions, permanent and temporary, that showcase the environment, nature, science, and space. CosmoCaixa also has a planetarium and exhibitions devoted to interaction such as touch and play for small children. It also has a bookstore, gift shop, library, teaching center and cafe. The museum is sponsored by la Caixa. Entry to the museum is free for students under 18. Adults too can enjoy at the museum with an entry ticket of 4 euros.



[7. The Museum of Aeronautics and Astronautics](#)

The Museum of Aeronautics and Astronautics, better known as the Air Museum, is an aeronautical museum located in Madrid, nearby (but separated by the M-40) from the Madrid-Cuatro Vientos Airport. It was established as a body of the Historical and Cultural Service of the Air Force of Spain (SHYCEA) with the purpose of acquiring, conserving and exhibiting the assets that constitute the historical heritage of Spanish aeronautics. It is a state owned museum and managed by the Ministry of Defense of Spain.



8. The Museum of Human Evolution

The Museum of Human Evolution, also known by its acronym MEH, is located in the Spanish city of Burgos and has been designed by the architect Juan Navarro Baldeweg. In the site on which it was built, it was in past centuries the disappeared convent of San Pablo de Burgos, of the order of the Dominicans. It is part of the network of regional museums of Castilla y León, together with the museums of the iron and mining industry of Sabero (León), contemporary art of León and ethnographic Zamora. Since its inauguration on July 13, 2010, and until July 8, 2011, the museum received a total of 279,000 visitors, 2 becoming the most visited museum in Castilla y León, and approaching the 10th. most visited museum in Spain. It constitutes the centerpiece of the Complex of Human Evolution. Architecturally, the museum has received more than 40 national and international awards.



[9. The Barcelona Football Club Museum](#)

The Barcelona Football Club Museum is a museum located in the facilities of the Camp Nou, in Barcelona, which exhibits all the trophies achieved by all the Catalan club's sports sections throughout history, as well as all kinds of objects related to their teams, players and social mass. It is the most visited museum in Catalonia. It was renamed "Museu President Núñez" in 2000, during the presidency of Joan Gaspart, and in honor of former president José Luis Núñez, founder of the museum.
