




1.6 Description of the Surveyed Respondents - Parents


All the parents involved in the survey answered the questions on-line and were willing to enter their email addresses what means that they believed in the process of analysis and expect that it will be useful and contributes to project implementation.

a) **Gender:** Altogether 134 parents filled in the survey: 64.2% were female and 35.8% were male.



b) Country: The parents come from four countries involved in the project "Hands on CLIL": Portugal, Spain, Slovakia and Turkey. According to the diagram 35.8% come from Portugal, the same number 35.8% of the parents come from Slovakia, 15.7% from Turkey and 12.7% from Spain.



c) Age: According to the statistics most of the parents respondents have their children in the age from 6 to 9, it is 52.2%, the second biggest group of the parents have their children from 10 to 11, it is 22.4%, then 14.2% of the parents respondents have their children older than 11 years old and 11.2% of the parents have children who attend pre-school education, they are from 3 to 5 years old.




School year






Your son /daughter uses English terms during their daily life?

h) **Importance of English:** It is obvious that English seems to be very important for future career from parents' point of view. 74.6% strongly agree with it, 23,1% agree and only 2.3% of them strongly disagree with it.





Learning language and content at the same time is a better way to learn a foreign language.



Learning language and content at the same time is a better way to learn content areas like Science, PE, Music or Arts.






Do you consider useful the presence of an English Teacher during the Subject lessons?

What subjects do you think your son /daughter should learn in English?








p) According to the graph more than three quarters of the respondents tust the methodology used at schools they children attend. 62.7% agree that it is modern methodology, 27.6% strongly agree and Only 6% disagree and 5% strongly disagree.

r) Use if ICT: The graph shows that 61.2% of parents agree that teachers use ICT in their teaching parctice, 23.9% strongly agree with it. However, 16% of them disagree and 8.9% strongly disagree.
