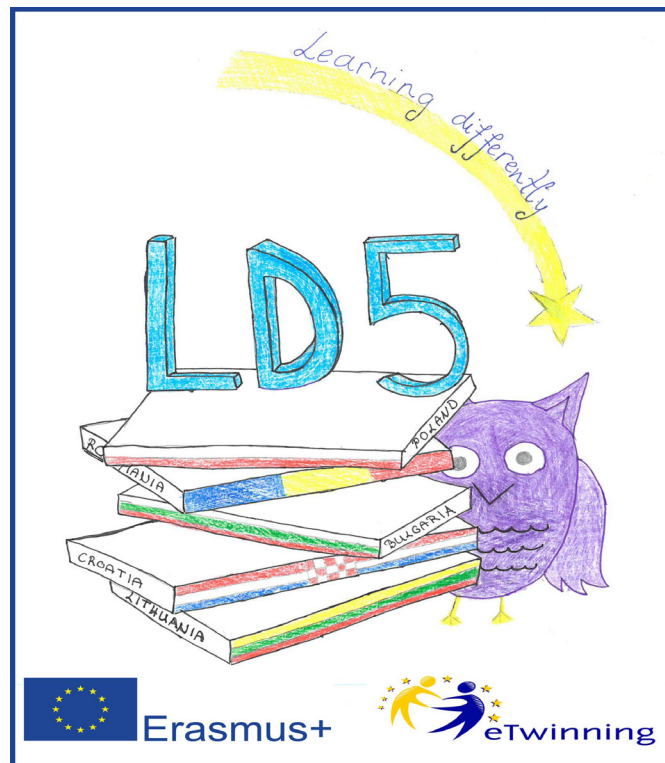

After we learned Polish legends, we participated in a quiz which tested our newly gathered knowledge on Polish traditions and myths.



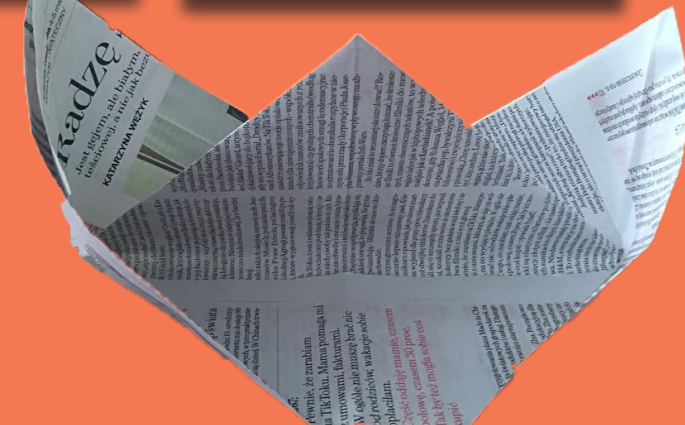


The most interesting workshop was the handcrafts workshop: "Tailoring workshops: reading comprehension exercises".

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NP Brijuni

Brijuni island group is the most interesting, the largest and the most indented group of islands along the coast of western Istria.



NP Plitvice lakes

Plitvice Lakes is the oldest and largest national park in the Republic of Croatia. The lake system is comprised of 16 named and several smaller unnamed lakes, cascading one into the next.



Northern Velebit National Park

Velebit is the largest though not the highest mountain range in Croatia. The important characteristic of Velebit is its simple, solid form, stiff cliffs, and the nakedness of seaward side and the wood-covered slopes of the Lika side. The basic geological characteristic of the mountains is karst; flora and fauna are abundant.

NP Mljet



The Mljet National Park is the oldest marine protected area in the Mediterranean and it has delighted its numerous visitors for 59 years with the colours and the scent of untouched nature.

NP Paklenica



Distinctive features of Paklenica National Park are autochthonous forests of Black Pine, several types of Beech forests and deep canyons with torrent flows of Velika and Mala Paklenica. Within the Paklenica National Park borders there are numerous testaments of interesting and unique cultural heritage.

NP Risnjak



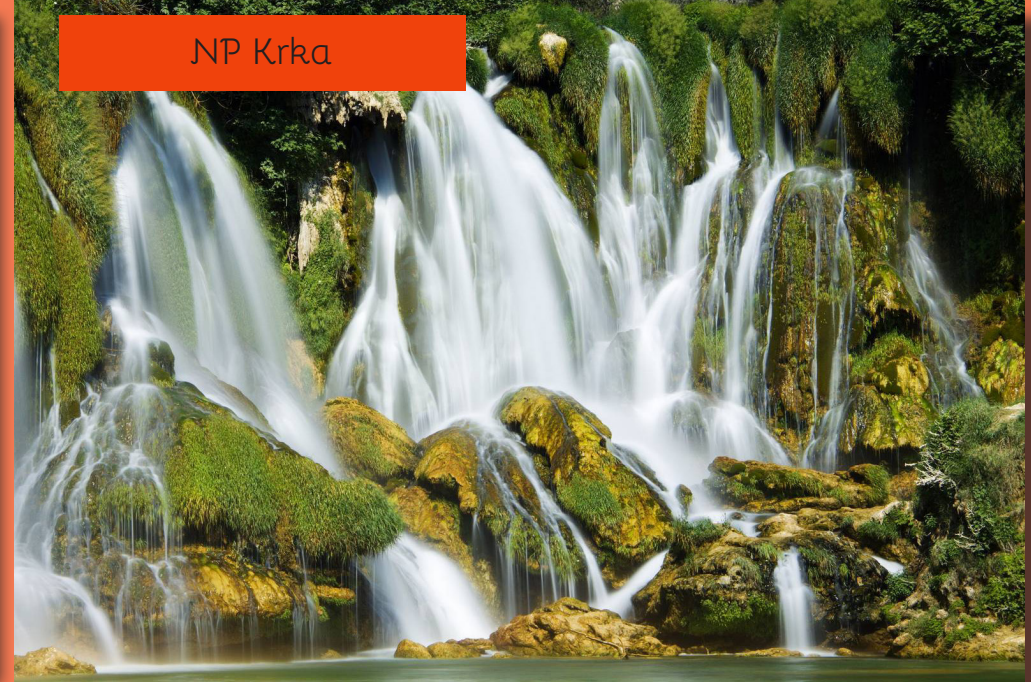
- strong climate and vegetation barrier between coastal and continental parts of Croatia.

NP Krka



The national park is a vast and primarily unaltered area of exceptional natural value, including one or more preserved or insignificantly altered ecosystems. The purpose of the park is primarily to serve science, culture, education and recreation, while tourism activities have also been introduced for its visitors.
