The Erasmus Spanish meeting from February 5th to 12th 2016

Students from five countries, Belgium, France, Germany, Italy and Spain, met in Seville for a week to discuss Waste and Energy.



The Corredor Verde is a natural park. The purpose of this site is to make the population aware of their environment. In this park we can see a lot of different species of trees and plants. It can be visited walking or biking along a 70-kilometer path. It is also possible to see animals during the walk. This road is situated near Seville and is crossed by the Guadiamar river. In 1998 the river has known a big ecologic catastrophe. A barrage blew out in the Aznalcollar mine and 6 million tons of toxic and acid mud poured into the river. The cleaning of the contaminated land took at least 3 years and its nature is now in a regeneration phase.


Enjoying experimental workshops

* Lecture on renewable energy sources

A Spanish teacher from university, Mr Silva came to meet us at high school during our stay in Seville. With a slide show, he told us about the sources of the various renewable energies. First, he defined the word energy so that we had the right sense of the term in mind. Next, with two questions: What is it for? Where is it from? We had already learnt a lot of things about the topic. Later, we saw different forms of renewable energy like electricity, different sources of energy such as biomass, wind, sun... Then we have seen the different ways to transform energies. Finally, Mr Silva spoke about non-renewable energies and finally, we asked him questions which he answered.

This presentation taught us a lot about the importance of renewable energies.

We went by bus to see a solar farm. The solar panels spread over the fields receive the light thanks to a collector, a kind of tower which is made of glass and reflects the sunlight focusing it onto the solar panels. Then the solar energy is transformed into electricity.

The Spanish students told us that this energy self-sufficient place provides energy for the towns around.
