The results are satisfying (Fig.1). There are some excellent results, especially usefulness of the project, language skills, cultural horizon and readiness to participate in other projects.

Despite being over 4.0 the results of work received the lowest mark. This may be justified by a reasonable self-assessment of produced outcomes by some participants.

Among things the students learned in the project the ones that stood out are team work, cultural awareness (knowing cultures of the participating countries and Jewish culture), horror of means of extermination and cruelty. Tolerance and responsibility are one of the biggest concepts mentioned throughout the survey. Among lesser yet mentioned as important are technical skills, interpersonal skills, ability to perform or present something in front of a varied audience. The students mention practical skills from the last visit like baking roosters or digital art skills.

The students mention how shock they were to see the extermination camp and that though they knew about that but the experience of visiting the camp made them realize and sympathise. It was also said that learning about the changes in the last 100 years resulted in their greater understanding of modern history.
