Lesson Plan

School: Grigore Moisil National College

Lesson: *Plan the arc of your speech*

Time: 50 minutes

Aim: Students will plan the arc of their speech.

Resources: notebooks, videos, video-projector, laptop

Methods: Conversation, elicitation, explanation, group work, individual work

Warm up:

Time: 5'

Aim: to engage students with the topic of the lesson

Procedure: Teacher asks students what makes a story great. Students brainstorm ideas and share them with the class.

Activity 1

Time: 15'

Aim: to identify the main elements/part of a story

Procedure: Teacher introduces 4 main concepts: hook, perspective, tension and closing. Students watch the TED talk below and decide whether it has all the 4 parts or not.

Activity 2

Time: 10'

Aim: to learn about storyboarding

Procedure: Students watch the video below and take notes. After watching the video, students discuss as a class about the importance of storyboarding.

Activity 3:

Time: 15'

Aim: to create a storyboard for their speech

Procedure: Teacher provides students with the following guiding questions.

- 1. What is the one idea you want people to walk away with?
- 2. How do you want to start and end your talk to make sure people are on the journey with you?
- 3. What is the logical sequence of events to get from the beginning to the end of your talk?

Students sketch out the different parts of their speech on index cards or sticky notes. Once finished, they share their storyboard with the group for feedback.
