We fondly remember the day dedicated to the mural painting in the courtyard of the Romanian high school, when at the end of the day the painting was ready, but you couldn't really realize how this miracle happened, because you always had the impression that the students were just talking, laughing, dancing, singing, playing and sometimes painting! How sad it was the last day in Messina, when lots of students were crying because they didn't want to end the mobility! How much joy there was on the show stage where our students danced together traditional Romanian dances! So much joy in the snowball fight on the Etna Volcano! How much curiosity we had at the entrance into the mosques in Turkey, with how much timidity we stepped into places of worship totally different from our cultures! How many hundreds of photos we all took on the Prague day, as we followed step-by-step our guide while giving correct answers and having magnets as a gift for this! Then the excitement of ending each day at the beach in Greece after the entire day was spent in churches, museums and monasteries!







Each stage of the project was accompanied by emotional challenges: some were traveling for the first time by plane, or they were on their first ferryboat trip, others for the first time away from their family, some were for the first time in a foreign country, the first time they talked to students from other countries, the first time they visited a school from another country.

And for the teachers it was just also challenging: for some it was the first experience with a group of students abroad, sometimes with great emotions when passing customs control, with the state of tension prolonged many days after returning from mobility, when you still have the impression that you have to supervise a group of teenagers that their parents left in your care. And here we are now, at the end of the project, with teacher friends and student friends from four other countries, with future plans to visit each other and to continue the collaboration in other projects.





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Together with all the hard working teachers in the project, we can all say that for us it is a great joy to know that we offered to our students the proper environment for them to make unforgettable memories.

Now we can say "Good bye" to our project. Or, and even better, as the Romanian students are saying to their Erasmus friends, "It's not goodbye, it's see you later."



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
