Equality in Finland

- A little bit of trivia
 - Finland gave women the right to vote in 1920, being the first country in Europe to do that.
 - Homosexuality was decriminalized in 1971, in 1981 it was no more classified as a sickness and in 2017 same-sex marriage was made legal.
 - The Finnish penal code prohibits racism in certain situations and the Finnish constitution bans discriminations and says that everyone is equal.

• Problems

- Minorities face discrimination in Finland.
- "The women's euro" in Finland is around 84 cents, the YLE article published in 2020 says. This problems roots to the 40s.
- Many studies also say that Finland is EU's second most dangerous place for a woman and one of the most racist countries in Europe.
- The LCBT+ community also faces legal issues and discrimination.

Helsinki, the capital of Finland

- Helsinki is the largest city of Finland, with 657 674 people living in there.
 - Even though the metro area population of Helsinki is 1305 000.
- Helsinki was made the capital of Finland in 1812, after the Finnish War in 1808-1809, when Finland was made a part of Russia.
 - The former capital was Turku.

Lapland

- Lapland is currently part of Finland, Sweden, Norway & Russia.
- The Sámi are the indigenous people of Lapland.
- In Lapland, reindeer herding, hunting and fishing have traditionally been practised.
- In summer Lapland has nightless night, when the sun does not set at all.
- Most of Lapland belongs to the coniferous forest zone.
- There are areas in northernmost Lapland where no forest grows due to the cold.
- Animals in Lapland:
 - o reindeers
 - arctic foxes
 - wolverines

Fazer

- Fazer is one of the largest corporations in the Finnish food industry, its products being exported to almost 40 countries.
- Fazer was founded by Karl Fazer in 1891.
- Fazer is best known for its classic milk chocolate: Fazer Blue, or Fazerin sininen
 - Other well known items are their salmiakki products and Tyrkisk Peber.
- Fazer is divided into five major areas:
 - Fazer Bakery
 - Fazer Confectionery
 - Fazer Lifestyle Foods
 - Fazer Food Services
 - Fazer Retail

Moomin

- Moomins are fairy tale characters created by Tove Jansson.
- The most famous Moomin character is the Moomintroll.
- Originally the Moomins were written in Swedish.
- Moomin books have been translated into more than 50 languages.
- The first Moomin work (Moomins and the great flood) was published in 1945.
 - Tove's brother Lars Jansson began publishing Moomin comics in 1954.

Moomins have been particularly popular in Nordic countries and Japan.

Famous Finnish authors

- Books have been written in finland since the introduction of the 16th century literary language.
- Mikael Agricola is considered the father of the Finnish literary language.

Movies

- The most watched finnish film is Tuntematon Sotilas from 1955.
 - Tuntematon Sotilas is based on a book with the same name, it was written in 1954 by Väinö Linna.
 - The book has been adapted into three movies, first released in 1955, second in 1985 and the third in 2017.
 - The story is about the soldiers who fought in the Continuation War.
- There is only one finnish book that has been adapted into a Hollywood film.
 - In 1954 a film called The Egyptian was released, it was based on the finnish book "Sinuhe egyptiläinen" written by Mika Waltari.
- In America there's the Oscars and in Finland there's the Jussi gaala.
- The Jussi award was invented in 1944 and in the gala actors, directors, writers etc. are awarded.
- Many finnish actors/actresses have been in Hollywood films and some finnish movies have gotten Oscar nominations.






Finnish national symbols
