

Attic red skyphos Late Archaic (or Early Classical) season with the signing of Ieron as potter and painter Makron as handles. On the B side Menelaus, armor, pulls his sword to Helen after thw fall of Troy, ready to avenge. Helen tries to find refuge in the sanctuary of Apollo. Venus is behind Helen, ready to intercede for salvation, as it turns the face of Helen to her husband and takes off her veil to reveal the charms of. Menelaus preparing to throw down his sword, enchanted by the beauty of Helen. The priest of the temple, Chrysis, and his daughter, Chryseis, also distinguished left. Their presence reminds the first events of the Iliad Epic. Priam is also seated (the name indicated) to monitor the scene, right below the handle. The scene is multifaceted and the red- figures covering almost the surface of the vase. Boston, Museum of Fine Arts, 13. 186.



Apoulikos red- bell- shaped crater. Attributed to the Painter of Stockholm 1999. In part A Paris and Helen. Paris wears Phrygian hat (pilos) and holds a kind of spear. Paris. Louvre Mouseum, K 6.



Sausage Nestorius attributed to painter Dolon, about 390- 380 B. C. in the upper zone of the vessel depicted Paris holding spear approaching Helen. Inserted handmaid and right sitting Helen. Back is a second maid holding parasol. To the left of the composition may be depicted Aeneas.




The abduction of Helen by Paris
