It is impossible to describe the concern, anxiety and fear of parents for a disabled child. When he/she is born and he/she is diagnosed, his/her parents take special care of him/her and want the best for him/her. The basic and most important thing is good and reliable preparation for life through high-quality education of a disabled child. Inclusive education plays a significant role here.

- Inclusive education is mainly defined as it is like: all learners are included. This means that students of traditional and special education meet in one classroom. In this form of education, both children without disabilities and children with disabilities work together, participate and learn together.
- It is a difficult task that requires a lot of dedication and unusual solutions, from educational to technical ones.

In inclusive education, all special needs related to disability will be able to receive support at school and in extra-curricular activities. It is important that rather than providing education in isolated areas, it is conducted in typical classrooms surrounded by peers. Disabled children take part in the normal educational process under the supervision of a teacher who provides them with the necessary support.

Teacher support usually consists of spending time with children, including the disabled. Help in completing tasks, often help in moving around the classroom, as well as uplifting, emotional support, raising the child's self-esteem, creating his / her good image against the background of the class. And the last but not the least, ensuring the child's simple safety while at school.

Let us now pay particular attention to the parents in the process of inclusive education. There is no doubt that they are most interested in the well-being of their disabled child. Parents try to create normal, unlimited conditions for development and activity. It is them that a disabled child can count on in any difficult situation. One of the most important tasks of parents is developing the children's independence and resourcefulness, entrusting responsibilities that help them achieve independence and responsibility for their actions.

- It is crucial to teach disabled children from an early age that it does not matter what you are, fit or unfit, the most important thing is to feel the same as everyone else, to overcome all obstacles that stand in the way of happiness, and not to give up.
- If in this process, the parent is supported by the school that provides the solid educational foundation and enables proper contact with peers, while giving a sense of value to a disabled child, we can consider it a success of the idea of inclusive education.

Advantages of Inclusive Education from a Parent's Perspective

- Educational support, learning under normal school conditions.
- Contacts with peers and proper psychosocial development of the child.
- Turning to healthy competition.
- Acquiring new experiences.
- Psychological and pedagogical support of the child by specialist teachers.

Disadvantages of inclusive education from a parent's perspective.


- Anxiety related to the process of adaptation to the school conditions by a disabled child.

- Concern for the possible deterioration of health.
- Deficiencies in the technical preparation of the classroom to the needs of a child's disability.
- Fears of insufficient teachers' competences.
