
# THE EUROPEAN DAY OF LANGUAGES 2020

#### French

#### Curtosities:

- French is spoken in 56 countries all over the world (it is the official language in 25).
   It was once the official language of England,
- between the second half of the 11th century and the end of the 14th.
  It is known to be one of the languages with the most seats in the spelling of words.
- One of the most difficult tongue twisters in the world in French : «si six scies scient six cyprès, six cent six scies scient six cent six cyprès» (In English, « if six saws saw six cypresses, six hundred and six saws saw six hundred and six cypresses).

### Greek

- Greek is the Indo-European language with the longest and most well-documented history, spanning 34 centuries of written records.
- The Greek alphabet emerged from the Phoenician script, and ended up giving rise, in turn, to the Latin, Cyrillic, Coptic, and several other writing systems.
- Along with Latin, Greek gave rise to several languages nowadays spoken.

#### Cuctidian expressions: "Hello": "Xaipere" ("Chairete")

- "Good Morning": "Καλημέρα" ("Kaliméra")
- "Thanks": "ευχαριστώ" ("Efcharistó")
- "Good bye": "αντιο σας" ("Antio sas")

- "Love you": "Σε αγαπώ" ("Se agapó")



#### Italian

#### Curicsities:

- The Italian alphabet consists of only 21 letters, the letters J, K, W, X, Y not being part of the alphabet, they are only used in foreign words.
- Italian is the official language of Italy, Switzerland, the Vatican, San Marino and the Military Sovereign Order of Malta.
- In Italy, almost all regions have a "regional language", derived from Italian.

#### Norwegian

#### Curicsities:

- Norwegian is not just one language, but two: Nynorsk (modern Norwegian and spoken among the population] and Bokmål (the "language of books" in its literal translation, which is learned at school and written).
- Norwegian belongs to the Indo-Germanic language family and is found next to Danish, Icelandic and Swedish the branch of Scandinavian languages.
- > The Norwegian language alphabet consists of a derivation of the Latin alphabet with the addition of the symbols: a. å and ø.

#### European Day of languages

- The European Day of languages was proclaimed by the European Commission and the Council of Europe and it was celebrated for the first time on September 26, 2001.
- It was created to celebrate and honor the linguistic diversity existing among the 47 Council of Europe member states, which is distributed by about eight hundred million people, the Europeans; to remember that this linguistic variety is a wealth of the common European heritage and therefore, it must be preserved forever and to promote multilingualism among Europeans.

- Portuguese is the sixth most spoken language in the world.
- Portuguese is the official language of nine countries: Angola, Brazil, Cape Verde, Guinea-Bissau, Equatorial Guinea, Mozambique, Portugal, São Tomé and Príncipe and East Timor.
- Portuguese is the official language of part of China, in Macau.
- Only 5% of people who speak Portuguese reside in Portugal. Of every 5 people who speak Portuguese, 4 are Brazilian, on average.


