This sneakers are from Indonesia. Indonesia is the fourth most populated country in the world (with about 260 million inhabitants) and it is made up of 17,000 islands that make it the largest island country. It also is the third country which has the greatest biodiversity in the earth. However, the traffic is a chaos in cities and tourist areas. Unfortunately, I couldn't find much information about how the sneakers were produced but I suppose that the workers who had made them are working in bad conditions like low salaries and more than 8 hours of work.

When this sneakers are ready to sell, they are transported to a big modern storehouse in order to get distributed around Spain. This storehouse has a large capacity of boxes and pallets, with a high inventory turnover and it is located in Caspe (Zaragoza). Its average workforce is about 144 people who work three daily shifts. After they get there, the workers organize and personalize (language, sets...) orders and extern companies transport them to their destination.

I had paid for them 34,95€ . After knowing all the work that goes into making a sneaker, it seems like a low price to me and I think that because of this, there are many workers who don't earn enough money. I usually buy new sneakers three or four times a year and after stop wearing them I usually drop sneakers into a clothes container or I give them to one of our family or friends if they can be used.

This sneakers are from Cambodia. Cambodia is a country in Southeast Asia. About 13 million people live in Cambodia. The people of Cambodia are called *Cambodians* or *Kampuchea*. Westerners tend to call the country Cambodia while Cambodians and other Asian people are more likely to call it the “Country of Kampuchea”. This country has the largest religious monument in the world. It is a Hindu/Buddhist temple called Angkor Wat and it is considered one of the wonders of the world. Apart from that has become a national symbol of Cambodia and even appears on the country's flag.

Cambodia is one of the cheapest places to produce. I couldn't find that much information about the production and transportation, but I have read that in Cambodia textile factories charge very little and barely reach 140 euros in salary. Other than that they doesn't work in good conditions. They suffer labor exploitation.

I think it costs me 34.95 euros. After knowing all the work that goes into making a sneaker, it seems like a low price to me and I think that because of this, there are many workers who don't earn enough money. It seems unfair to me and I feel sorry for them for all the work they do while earning very low wages.

I buy new sneakers when I see that I really need new ones and when they are too worn out. So I usually buy new sneakers two or three times a year. After I stop wearing shoes because I just don't like them or because they are worn out, I drop them into a clothing recycling container that goes to Caritas or give them to my neighbors.

So as to improve the situation, customers can stop shopping too much sneakers if it isn't necessary and when they become useless, we can recycle them. Moreover, we can donate the sneakers to someone else when they are too small for we to use.
