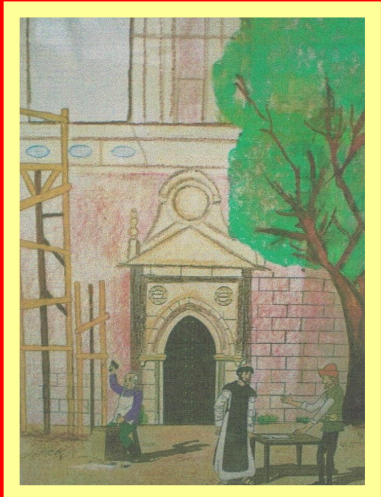

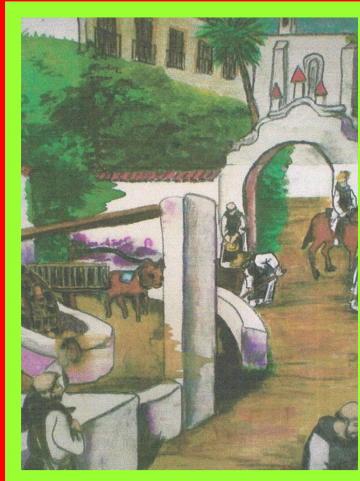
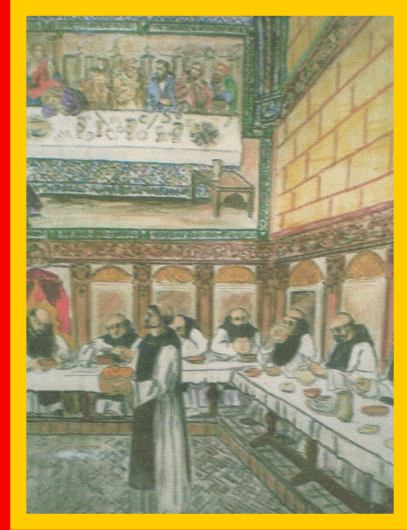




In the sixteenth century, which of Gold is called,

 Candelaria was its name, and small it remained until, the XVII century when another church was built.



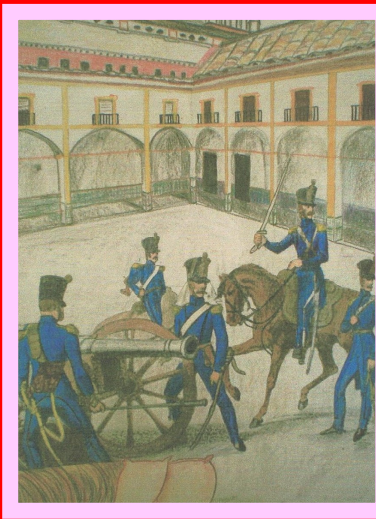
It was the church of San Jacinto, with his convent next door, where the Dominican monks lived like brothers.
