


Background Information

- Austrian-Hungarian monarchy ended in 1918
- Austria became a democratic republic
- In 1933, the parlament was suspended and rebellions started
- In 1938, Austria became part of the "Third Reich" and was oppressed by Adolf Hitler




After the ending of the WW II

In 1945, Austria and the capital city Vienna were devided into four parts by the allies.



Allied Occupation sectors in Austria (1945-1955).





27th of April 1945: a provisional State Government was formed, headed by Karl Renner (Father of the Republic)



Huge economic problems due to the war, lack of food and important consumer goods.



As soon as the government was recognized by the Allies, ELECTIONS took place.



The three political parties were: the Socialist Party, People's Party and Communist Party.



The Republic of Austria was still under Allied occupation and not completely sovereign

Independence of Austria

May 15th 1955 the Austrian Independence Treaty was signed by the Allies and Austrian politicians in the Castle of Belvedere, Vienna.







Since the 1950s the Austrian economy has gradually recovered


With the fall of the iron curtain in 1989 Austria's position in the European structure changed once again





1995: Austria joins EU

- In 1995 Austria officially joined the European Union because of economic and safety reasons.
- 2002 the currency Schilling was replaced by the euro.



Recent developements

• Sebastian Kurz was forced to resign

 Austrian president Alexander Van der Bellen announced a new government, headed by Brigitte Bierlein, our first female chancellor.

Parliament Building

The government meets in the parliament building in Vienna erected by Theophil Hansen in 1883. He studied Ancient Greek architectal style. Hansen justified the Greek Style of the government building saying that the Greeks were the first people to love freedom and democracy.
