

Sugarcane munda Technique

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CHARACTERISTIQUES

Cane byproducts. Not only sugar is produced from that spiky and tall stem of the cane, it is a plant that offers various products and by-products. ... Nothing is wasted from sugarcane. Its leaves and bagasse are used in animal feed such as cattle and pigs.

Technique

The technique used to produce this rum is to process the sugar cane.

First the harvesting and crushing of the raw material takes place to obtain the sugar juice from the sugar cane. Initially this process was considered a product derived from the sugarcane industry. The juice is purified, filtered and heated using the technique called 'crystallization', by which sugar is crystallized.

USED MATERIALS

The material used is mainly sugarcane along with the tools necessary for this process. The area of origin of this rum is Andalusia, and in particular the city of Granada.

History

Cane is native to New Guinea, in Indonesia, Oceania, to northern Australia, from where it spread throughout Southeast Asia, especially India. From here and following the course of migratory movements, invasions and trade, the cane reached different areas of Africa and Europe, implanting itself in tropical and subtropical countries. With the Arab expansion and across the Mediterranean, the cane reached the Iberian Peninsula. As a result of the invasion of this one by General Tarik, after the battle of the Guadalete and defeat of King Visigodo Don Rodrigo in 711, the cane arrives on 755 and its cultivation is implanted in the Kingdoms of Valencia and Granada during the S IX, especially on the Andalusian coasts of Malaga, Granada and Almeria. Where diho cultivation prospered the most, achieving maximum performance, was in the Las Vegas of Motril and Salobreña, due to the quality of the land and better environmental conditions, due to the tropical climate, more benign and with fewer frosts, than in Las Vegas Malaga and Adra.
