

The new charter set the following goal of Comecon:

- intesifying and improving cooperation and development in socialist economic integration
- supporting the planned development of the national economies
- acceleration of economic and technical progress
- increasing the level of industrialization
- increasing the welfare of the peoples in the Counsil's member countries

Comecon was supposed to coordinate economic policies of satellite countries in favour of the Soviet empire into autarky model, it means to make them self-sufficient and simultaneously minimizing economic exchange with capitalist countries and consequently, separating Eastern Europe from western world.

With the end of Communism in Eastern Europe, Comecon ceased to exist on June 28, 1991.
